



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Dear Pathshala Members

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

Cool Cameos

ZEBRAS live in herds and when the herd moves about, the black and white waves merge easily with the tall grass in the surroundings. The moving wavy pattern thoroughly confuses their main predator, the lion.





SOME **chameleons** change colour to match their surroundings. The colour they acquire can range from pink, blue, green and yellow to even black.



THE **leafy sea dragon** has little leaf-like appendages which make it look like a piece of seaweed. Since it lurks among clumps of seaweed, this disguise allows it to easily sneak up on its prey or hide from enemies. THE walking stick insect is shaped like the twig of a tree. When the insect stands still, it is impossible to tell it apart from real twigs.





THE caterpillar of the **swallowtail butterfly** resembles the droppings of a bird. Its camouflage helps it stay alive as no animal is interested in bird droppings.

THE insect known as **orchid mantis** has a beautiful white and pinkish-purple colouring, and petal-shaped legs that help it to easily blend with the flowers of the orchid it inhabits.







AMAZING ANIMALS



The Sixth Sense!

While most creatures share our five senses of sight, hearing, odour, taste and touch, some also have senses other than these.

A **pit viper** has a pair of deep 'pits' between its nostrils and eyes. These heat-sensing organs help the viper to spot a prey in the dark by sensing the amount of heat given out by it. For instance, a mouse may appear as a bright ball to the viper when it hunts at night.

> A **fish** has a special sense organ called the lateral line which combines the sense of touch and hearing. It also gauges changes in the water pressure as well as the vibrations that warn the fish of predators in the vicinity.

Many **migratory birds** are able to detect Earth's magnetic field and navigate great distances. This ability is called magnetoreception. It is best observed in domestic homing pigeons.

Electroreception is the amazing ability of **sharks** and **rays** to detect electrical fields in their surroundings. The salty water of the sea is a good conductor of electricity. The shark is able to detect its prey from the electrical charges that are emitted when a fish contracts its muscles. The hammerhead shark is especially known for its enhanced electroreceptory sense.


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


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Manuscripts of a Bygone Age

THE Dead Sea Scrolls are the oldest known manuscripts of any books of the Bible. Some of the scrolls may be more than 2000 years old. They were discovered in the mid 1900s in caves near the northwestern shore of the Dead Sea in Palestine and Israel. The first group of scrolls was discovered in 1947 by a group of schoolboys in a cave. Subsequently, archaeologists and Bedouins found 10 more caves containing ancient writings.

Most of the manuscripts are made of leather or papyrus. The scrolls also include the fragments of the *Septuagint* the earliest Greek translation of the Old Testament and parts of the *Book of Job* written in Aramaic. They include writings of the Qumran community, one of the oldest groups of

Palestinian Jews, almost 2000 years old.

Other scrolls found on the western shore of the Dead Sea are from a later historical period and have been dated to 200 AD.

Grand Canal

THE Grand Canal of China is an immense waterway, 1776 kilometres long. It connects four major rivers — the Huanghe, Yangtze, Huai and Qiantang, and passes through some of the most beautiful parts of China.

It was built over a period of several centuries by various Chinese emperors who forced their subjects to work on the project. It is believed that two million people died during the work. The main purpose of the canal was to mobilize troops in times of war, but it became used mostly to transport food from the fertile South to the barren North.

Part of the canal is still in use, mostly to transport food and raw materials to factories and warehouses. It is China's and probably the world's oldest and longest canal.











Japanese Hotspot

BEPPU, a city on the island of Kyushu, is one place in Japan where you can say you have been to hell and back! Home to the second largest volume of hot water in the world after Yellowstone Park (USA), Beppu has nine major geothermal hot spots, locally called the 'Nine Hells (jigoku) of Beppu'. It is a popular tourist spot.

With temperatures ranging from 50° to 90°C, these nine springs are too hot to bathe in, but they present spectacular multicolored vistas of nature at full steam. Of them, the Oniishibozu Jigoku

is a hot pit of mud bubbles that resemble the shaven heads of monks. The picturesque turquoise blue waters of Umi Jigoku rise up in puffs of billowing steam. Chinoike Jigoku or 'Blood Pond Hell' is so named due to its



photogenic pool of red water. The milky white water of Shiraike Jigoku explains its name — 'White Pond Hell'. In the vicinity is also a geyser that spouts every half-hour for about five minutes.

Underground Wonder

THE Carlsbad Caverns in the Carlsbad Caverns National Park, New Mexico, is one of the largest underground caverns or caves in the world. The caves are believed to have been



hollowed out some 60 million years ago by the dissolving action of water on limestone.

There are about 45 km of connecting corridors and chambers. The deepest known level is 316m below the earth's surface. The main chamber, called the Big Room, is the largest underground chamber in North America. It is nearly 610m long and 335m wide. Its ceiling arches 77m from the floor.

The roofs and floors of the chambers are full of colourful stalactites and stalagmites (calcium carbonate formations) of various shapes. Some of them resemble Chinese pagodas. A part of the caves is known as the Bat Cave because of the millions of bats that come there looking for insects during summer.









Natures Light Display

A spectacular display of lights occurs in the polar regions, when dancing columns of light of various hues illuminate the night sky. This display of lights is called aurora polaris.

Auroral displays occur when charged particles from the sun interact with gases in the earth's atmosphere. They are seen at high altitudes, from 100 to 1000 km above the earth because the earth's magnetic field draws solar particles into the polar region. The particles collide with the gas molecules in the atmosphere, exciting the molecules and causing luminescence.

Auroras are seen in a variety of forms including arcs, bands, filaments, curtains, fans, flames and streamers of various shapes. Some auroras extend across the sky for

thousands of kilometres. They are called aurora borealis or the Northern Lights in the Northern Hemisphere and aurora australis in the Southern Hemisphere.

Long auroral displays are generally accompanied by a disturbance in the earth's magnetic field and an interference in radio, telephone and telegraphic transmission.

Whirlpools of Norway



ONE of the world's strongest maelstroms or giant whirlpools is located off the coast of Norway, just north of the Arctic Circle.

The whirlpool, called Saltstraumen, is created by powerful currents four times a day. As the water whirls around, the air above it moves with an eerie, moaning sound.

The whirlpool is a spectacular sight at any time but in stormy weather when there are heavy dark clouds in the sky and a cold wind is blowing, the saltstraum takes on a menacing appearance and whirls with a fury that leaves the viewer both awed and humbled.





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Temple of Angkor Vat

BETWEEN the 9th and the 13th centuries, the Khmer dynasty ruled over a large empire from their capital Angkor in central Cambodia (now Kampuchea). During their reign, sculpture, architecture and engineering reached a pinnacle. Their culture was heavily influenced by Hinduism brought by the Indians who arrived there in the 1st century A.D. The Khmer kings built immense lavishly-carved temples of stone and brick.

Angkor sprawls over a plain and contains a complex of 72 major monuments. The largest and the most magnificent is Angkor Vat, constructed in the 12th century by Suryavarman II. The building was his observatory, shrine and tomb.

Lively sculptures portray scenes from the Hindu epics and myths as well as the life of Suryavarman. The entire temple was built with stone blocks which fit so neatly together that no binding agent was used!

Angkor was abandoned in the 15th century, after the Thais sacked it. Thick rain

forest soon covered most of the temples. It was a Frenchman named Henri Mouhot who revealed the site to the

world in 1860.

Aalu Vilakku

THE Aalu Vilakku is a lamp used at the Chettikulangara Devi Temple in the Alleppey district of Kerala. It is 3 m high and is the biggest temple lamp in the country.

The 13 tiers of the lamp resemble the branches of a banyan tree, called 'aalu' in Malayalam. The lamp is made from 1,500 kg of gunmetal and a thousand wicks can be lit in it.



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UNIQUE RACES

The Great Wall Marathon

EACH year in May, China hosts the Great Wall Marathon—a race that offers an extraordinary opportunity for runners to test their skills on the greatest man-made wonder on earth.

The race is gruelling—participants have to negotiate 5164 stone steps and steep climbs and descents, often under hot weather conditions. While a part of the run (about 9km) is held on the Wall, the rest of the route winds through mountains, offering a stunning view of the beautiful countryside. Runners also get to experience the mystique of the stone fortress while passing through hidden staircases and watchtowers on the Wall.

The Marathon was the brainchild of



Wichard Holscher, an architect and running enthusiast from Munich. He hit upon the idea of holding a race on the Great Wall as part of his China tour itinerary.

Empire State Run-up

FOR more than 40 years, the Empire State Building in New York was the tallest skyscraper in the world. Not many visitors would shun the elevators to climb the stairs of this 102-storey building. But each year, it hosts a stair- climbing race that draws sportspeople from all over the world.

Known as the Empire State Building Run-up, the race involves climbing 1576 stairs up to the observation deck on the 86th floor of the building — a vertical distance of over 300m! The oldest among stair-climbing competitions in the world, it began in 1978 as a casual race and soon became popular.

Incredibly, many climbers have made it to the top in less than fifteen minutes. In 2003, Paul Crake, a professional cyclist from Australia, completed the race in a record 9 minutes and 33 seconds!

> • Mount Niesen in Switzerland has the longest staircase in the world and hosts an annual stairclimbing competition where participants negotiate 11,674 steps!





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Make Your Own Rain Gauge

What you need:

A jar, a ruler, a sheet of blank paper, a ball point pen and a funnel (its mouth should have the same diameter as that of the jar).

What you do:

- Trace the millimetre side of the ruler on the blank sheet of paper.
- Stick this on the jar with the scale side facing inside so that you will be able to read it easily when you look into the jar.
- Place the funnel on the mouth of the jar.
- Dig a little hole in your garden or compound. Place the empty jar in it in the morning in such a way that only the open mouth of the jar and the funnel are visible.
- Rain water will fall through the funnel and collect inside the jar.
- At the end of the day, remove the jar from the ground and check the reading on the scale to know how many millimetres of rain has fallen that day.



Weather Flower

Find out if you can predict the weather!

Cut out a flower from blotting paper, dip it in a solution of salt, and let it dry. Place it anywhere in your room. If the flower turns pink, it means that there is moisture in the air and hence you are likely to have rain. If it turns white, it means that the atmosphere is dry and you can be assured of a dry day.







HOW IS HE DOING IT??

The Magic Pencil

Here's a trick you could master easily and perform at a party.

What You Need:

- A coloured bottle with an opening large enough to fit a pencil easily. It's important that your bottle is not see-through.
- A long pencil with a good long point. The pencil should be much longer than the bottle so that it will stick out when put inside the bottle.
 - A rectangular eraser that will go through the bottle's opening lengthwise.

To Perform:


- 1. Pass the empty bottle around the group so that each one can examine the bottle to ensure that it is empty.
- Next, pass the pencil around and while everyone is busy examining it, quietly insert the eraser into the bottle.
- Now take the pencil and put it inside the bottle (and as you do this, make sure that the pencil point pierces the eraser).
- 4. Hold the bottle up for all to see.

Mutter *abracadabra* and turn the bottle upside down (pull the pencil to make sure that the eraser is tightly wedged in the mouth of the bottle).

- Then let go of the pencil. Your friends will be astonished to see the pencil hanging without any support.
- 6. Finally, turn the bottle over and take the pencil out with a flourish (but before taking the pencil out, push it slightly to release the eraser without arousing any suspicion).










Butterfly Card

You need: Marble paper, card paper, gum, sketchpens

What you do:

- Take two sheets of marble paper of contrasting colours.
- Draw and cut out two circles from each sheet, one bigger than the other.
- Make tiny pleats in each paper circle.
- Stick the two together at the inner edges as shown making two pairs. These are the pairs of wings.
- Place them side by side on the front face of a thick card paper rectangle folded in half.
- Glue the wings to the card, leaving a little white space in between.
- Draw the body, head and pair of antennae as shown. Colour. Write your greeting inside.
- Your butterfly card is ready!



Rainbow Coasters

You need: Wooden ice-cream sticks, paint, waterproof gum.

What you do:

- Apply waterproof gum liberally on three ice-cream sticks.
- 2. Stick four sticks over it as shown in the picture.
- 3. Allow to dry.
- Make seven such coasters and paint them in rainbow colours – violet, indigo, blue, green, yellow, orange and red.









The Jumping Coin

What you need: Just two coins!

What you do:

- 1. Show the two coins to your friend.
- 2. Place the coins in her palms, one in each palm.
- Take the coin from her left palm and press it in the hollow of her left elbow. Ask her to fold her arm tightly so that the coin does not fall down.
- 4. Similarly, take the coin from her right palm, press it in the hollow of her right elbow and ask her to fold the right arm tightly. Now tell her that you can magically transfer the coin from her left elbow to her right elbow.
- 5. Chant *abracadabra* and wave your magic wand over your friend thrice. Then ask her to unfold her left arm. She will not find the coin there. Ask

This is a simple magic trick you could try on your friends.

her to unfold her right arm and she will be astonished to find both the coins there.



The Trick:

When you tell her that you are going to take the coin from her left palm and keep it in the hollow of her left elbow, make sure to press the coin so that she feels the pressure of the coin in her elbow. However, don't leave the coin there. Keep it in the hollow of the right elbow along with the coin from her right palm.



Remember, to perform like a magician, practise the trick several times before you try it out on your friends!







Sugar Cube Trick

You need: A pencil with a dark, black lead and sharp point; cubes of sugar; a glass of water

What you do:

Before the show, practise writing the mirror images of the numbers from 1 to 9.

- 1. Call up a volunteer from the audience. Ask her to choose a number between 1 and 9.
- Write it on one face of the sugar cube pressing the pencil really hard.
- Hold the sugar cube between your forefinger and thumb in such a way that the number transfers to your thumb.
- Put the cube in the glass of water after announcing, "Now I will put the cube in water."
- Hold the volunteer's hand over the water so that your thumb presses against his palm and the number is transferred on to his skin.
- 6. Mutter the magic word like *abracadabra*.
- Presto! Hold her hand up to reveal the number that seems to have transferred magically from the sugar cube to her palm!














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Road to Heaven

"It's a magical sword," said the man. "When you're using it, it stretches itself and strikes the enemy no matter how far away he is."


Hodja hurried home and returned with a pair of firetongs.

Toasty Chickpeas

To serve 4 people, you need:

4 slices of toasted brown bread, a cup of boiled chickpeas or kabuli channa, 2 small tomatoes, 2 small onions, 1 cucumber, a handful of coriander leaves, ¼ spoon chilli powder, ¼ spoon amchur powder and salt to taste.

What you do:

- Chop onions, tomatoes, cucumber and coriander leaves (you could ask a grown up to help you).
- Mix this with the boiled and mashed channa.
- Add chilli powder, amchur and salt.
- Spread the mixture on toasted bread and serve.



Tip:

You could replace boiled chickpeas with sprouted chickpeas. Sprouting increases the vitamin content in the chickpeas. Soak the chickpeas overnight, drain the water and keep it in a wet muslin cloth until you see little white sprouts appear on them.

Banana Boats

To serve four people, you need:

2 small bananas, vanilla ice cream – a family pack, honey, cornflakes, 2 slices of orange, chocolate sauce, 4 brown raisins and 4 toothpicks.



What you do:

- Place a layer of vanilla ice cream in the serving dish.
- Layer the ice cream with honey.
- Sprinkle cornflakes all over the honey.
- Put another layer of ice cream over this.
- Peel the bananas, cover them with chocolate sauce and place them over the ice cream with their curved sides up to resemble boats.
- Insert toothpicks into the orange slices and fix them vertically on the bananas.

Fix the brown raisins at one end of the remaining toothpicks and pierce the other ends into each of the orange slices so that they resemble boatmen and the toothpicks with the raisins look like oars.

Crunchy, Tangy Delight

Try this tasty carrot snack!

What you need:

A large carrot, 2 baby carrots, a raw mango, a tomato, an onion, a handful of peanuts, a tbsp. fresh coriander leaves, a tbsp. honey and salt to taste.

What you do:

- Wash, peel and grate the baby carrots and mango.
- Chop the tomato and onion into tiny pieces.
- Crush the peanuts in a pounder.
- Mix them altogether and add honey, chopped coriander leaves and salt to the mixture.

 Wash and peel the large carrot. Cut it lengthwise into four flat pieces.

- Place the carrot sticks in a serving dish.
- Spread the carrot mixture on each carrot stick. Enjoy the sweet and sour, tasty and healthy snack!

Tip: You could substitute raw, grated carrots with boiled, mashed carrots mixed with a spoonful of butter and a dash of pepper and salt. Add the remaining ingredients and spread them over steamed carrot sticks.

Mango Tarts

What you need:

250g butter, 150g powdered sugar, 350g flour, 5g baking powder, 20g whipped cream, 1 egg, a drop of vanilla essence, mango crush as required, a plastic cover, scissors and tart pans.

What you do:

- Place the butter and sugar in a bowl and beat until the mixture becomes smooth.
- Break the egg in a bowl, and add it to the mixture along with the essence. Blend well.
- Add the flour and mix it gently into a dough.
- Pinch the dough into crude balls and press them into the tart pans so that they take the shape of the pans.
- Bake the tarts in an oven for 20 minutes at 150°C.

- Meanwhile, beat the whipped cream with mango crush till fluffy.
- Fill a plastic cover with the cream and mango mixture. Make a small cut at the bottom corner of the plastic cover and squeeze out the filling on to the top of the tarts once they have cooled.
